

ADT ENTRY REQUIREMENTS

AQA - Fine Art

Students are required to have a minimum grade C in a Design subject. Students will need to demonstrate drawing ability through observational drawing tasks set either before or at the beginning of the course, together with written critical analysis work that will allow for staff to assess suitability.

WJEC – Graphics, Photography, Textiles and 3D Design

Students are required to have a minimum grade C in a Design subject. An introductory task will be set on sign up day involving research, critical analysis work, observational drawing and/or making tasks that will allow staff to assess the commitment, skill base and suitability of students applying for their courses.

<u>Art A Level</u>

The AQA A Level Art syllabus encourages a broad approach, which allows you to develop a sound grounding, in a number of areas while still exploring the subject in depth.

Although a GCSE Art grade C pass is normally required for taking the A Level course, suitable students who can demonstrate drawing skills and creativity will be considered. It is

expected that you will have developed sufficient understanding and skills for the programme of study at 'A' level to be rewarding and enjoyable in its own right.

The course involves the development of your skills and understanding in drawing and painting and mixed media with a greater emphasis on depth and focus.

Looking at contemporary and historical art styles will form the basis for critical and contextual studies alongside your own practical work.

You will need to use study periods as well as up to 5 hours homework each week to continue and add to your class work.

The Post 16 Art Room in Design is available to be used outside of normal lesson times in order for you to get the most out of the course.

Art & Design: 3D Design A Level

The WJEC syllabus encourages a broad approach that allows students to develop a sound grounding in several 3D areas. It is able to accommodate particular areas of interest that you may wish to pursue.

Although a GCSE Resistant Materials grade C pass is usually required for taking the AS/A2 Level course, students that can demonstrate the necessary skills will also be considered.

The main skills developed through this course include;

- The artistic-creative knowledge and understanding associated with 3 dimensional design
 - including sculpture.
- Research, analysis, discussion and evaluation of 3 dimensional design techniques and
 - products.
- The development of specialist terminology related directly to 3 dimensional design processes.
- Organisation, selection and communication of ideas, solutions and responses in creative

and original ways.

- How ideas, feelings and meanings can be conveyed and interpreted through 3 dimensional design and products.
- A variety of practical skills using a range of resistant materials.
- Course content includes, ceramics, jewellery, product and industrial design, theatre design and craft.

You will need to spend at least 5-7 hours per week of study time on homework tasks to continue and add to coursework. You will be expected to attend a primary research visit that will be organised early in Year 12. You will need to seek opportunities to broaden your knowledge and understanding of 3D Design through visits to exhibitions, and the purchase of specialist materials will be necessary throughout the course.

Art & Design: Graphic Design A Level

The WJEC syllabus encourages a broad approach that allows you to develop a sound grounding in several graphic design areas. It is able to accommodate any particular areas of interest that you may wish to pursue.

Although a GCSE Graphic Design or Art grade C pass is usually required for taking the AS/A2 level course, students that can demonstrate the necessary skills will also be considered.

The course involves the development of your design ability to meet peoples' needs. This response might be arrived at through plans, processes and outcomes that are adventurous and

risk-taking, or remain close to attempting to solve the basic problems introduced by function,

aesthetics and appearance, ethics, production, marketing, time and resources.

You will need to spend at least 5 – 7 hours per week of your own time on homework tasks to

continue and add to coursework. You will be expected to attend a primary research visit that will be organised early in Year 12. You will need to seek opportunities to broaden your knowledge and understanding of Graphic Design through visits to graphical exhibitions.

Food and Hospitality

BTEC Level 3 Subsidiary Diploma in Hospitality

Syllabus: Edexcel

This BTEC National (Subsidiary Diploma) builds upon the concepts studied and skills developed in years 10 and 11. Although the BTEC extended certificate in Food and Hospitality is not essential for taking this course it is expected that students have a high interest in food and have sufficient skills and confidence for the practical aspects of the course.

As in years 10/11 the course is broken down into units. Every unit has a credit value that contributes to the overall qualification. Students will be awarded a Pass, Merit, Distinction or Distinction* qualification grades.

Subject Content

There are mandatory units: The Hospitality Industry (done in year 12) Principles of supervising Customer Service Performance in Hospitality, Leisure, Travel and Tourism Customer Service (done in year 13)

Four additional units will be chosen from the list below.

European Food Asian Food Advances skills and techniques in Producing desserts and Petite Fours Contemporary World Food Planning and Managing a Hospitality Event Industry Related Project in Hospitality
