The 23rd consecutive Groby Community College musical was once again a great success.



SAFEGUARDING INFORMATION FOR PARENTS

Our college feels it is of the utmost importance to have good systems for protecting children and safeguarding their welfare throughout all the activities which the college undertakes. This means that staff and volunteers must be alert to possible concerns about every student, and to report these in a proper fashion. The college has a safeguarding and child protection policy which parents/carers can view on our website under the 'About Us' section 'Documents/Policies'.

It is important for parents to be aware that:

- Staff and volunteers in the college have a duty to report concerns about a child, whether this means the child may be in need of additional support or help of some kind or whether it is thought that a child may have been abused or be at risk of abuse.
- There are four categories of abuse: physical, sexual, emotional and neglect.
- In some cases the college is obliged to refer children to children's social care staff, for children to be assessed for their needs or if an investigation into possible child abuse is required. In many cases there will already have been discussions between college staff and the parents of the child, and the situation and concerns will not be a surprise to the parents. However, parents may not be told that the college has referred their child to children's social care if it is thought that this might put the child at risk.
- Children's social care tries to carry out its enquiries in a sensitive fashion. It has to gather information and generally it can be open with parents about the steps being taken.
- If you think your child may have been abused you should contact the children's social care office. If you think the abuse may have happened in college, contact the Principal or the Designated Senior Person for Child Protection, who is Mrs Evans, Assistant Principal. If you think your child has been hurt, arrange to visit your doctor. Comfort and reassure your child.
- If college staff need to express concerns about a child or refer a child to children's social care, it is understood that this can cause distress or anger for the child's parents.



On 26 November some of Year 10s received a visit from Zubair Moti, an employee from Jaguar Land Rover (JLR), and Vanessa Breward from LEBC. A talk was given by Zubair in the field of Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths (STEM) with the aim of inspiring the next generation of STEM professionals. Zubair demonstrated how mechanical and software engineering are used in the motor production industry by JLR and his role in this successful company.

Students were challenged to find a career that does not utilise any of the STEM subjects and this proved a fruitless search as almost all sectors of employment encompass these.

This was an inspirational experience and gave our students a real world example and insight of where a STEM career could lead. It reinforced to our students that what is covered in the curriculum at Groby Community College also relates to industry and professional careers. Zubair ended his session with a talk and then presented each student all with a JLR goodie bag, which added to their enthusiasm!




GLOBAL ENTERPRISE WEEK

260 students (155 Year 10 and 105 Year 11) were awarded an Outstanding Progress certificate based on their most recent set of reports. To get this certificate year 11 students had to achieve on or above their target grade in all subjects. Year 10 students have aspirational target grades and to get this certificate had to achieve 3 levels of progress from primary school in all subjects.

TRAFFIC SAFETY ON CAMPUS

If your child is in the Post 16 centre and they drive a car to the college, then they will need to apply for a parking space by speaking to Miss Barson (Post 16 Admin Support) in order to get an application form. Car access for Post 16 students will be assessed on an individual basis.
