Like all public bodies, schools and colleges have a statutory duty to challenge inequality, foster good relations and tackle discrimination against individuals and groups irrespective of gender, disability and ethnicity. The EQualities Award pays tribute to those that go the extra mile to become equalities champions. To gain the award, which is recognised by Ofsted, staff and governors undertook a systematic review of the college's policies and practice and supplied a wide range of evidence which was independently assessed and verified.

The award was presented by Dr Chris Derrington, Director of the EQualities Award who said 'In our view, Groby Community College is a very worthy recipient of this award. The

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SAFEGUARDING INFORMATION FOR PARENTS

Our college feels it is of the utmost importance to have good systems for protecting children and safeguarding their welfare throughout all the activities which the college undertakes. This means that staff and volunteers must be alert to possible concerns about every student, and to report these in a proper fashion. The college has a safeguarding and child protection policy which parents/carers can view on our website under the 'About Us' section 'Documents/Policies'.

It is important for parents to be aware that:

- Staff and volunteers in the college have a duty to report concerns about a child, whether this means the child may be in need of additional support or help of some kind or whether it is thought that a child may have been abused or be at risk of abuse.
- There are four categories of abuse: physical, sexual, emotional and neglect.
- In some cases the college is obliged to refer children to children's social care staff, for children to be assessed for their needs or if an investigation into possible child abuse is required. In many cases there will already have been discussions between college staff and the parents of the child, and the situation and concerns will not be a surprise to the parents. However, parents may not be told that the college has referred their child to children's social care if it is thought that this might put the child at risk.
- Children's social care tries to carry out its enquiries in a sensitive fashion. It has to gather information and generally it can be open with parents about the steps being
- If you think your child may have been abused you should contact the children's social care office. If you think the abuse may have happened in college, contact the Principal or the Designated Senior Person for Child Protection, who is Mrs Evans, Assistant Principal. If you think your child has been hurt, arrange to visit your doctor. Comfort and reassure your child.
- If college staff need to express concerns about a child or refer a child to children's social care, it is understood that this can cause distress or anger for the child's parents.

STUDENT ACHIEVEMENT

There was a career opportunity during the summer holiday for Oliver Talbot a current Year 12 student, who spent four days at Newcastle University and a further four at Plymouth University. The opportunity arose through the Smallpeice Trust which is an independent charitable trust which promotes engineering as a career, primarily through the provision of residential courses for young people aged 12 to 18.

Whilst at Newcastle Uni Oliver attended an Advanced Marine Technology Course and at Plymouth Uni he enjoyed a unique learning experience with a group of 39 students, aged 15 to 17 discovering what is involved in the creation and maintenance of many different types of ships including aircraft carriers, yachts, submarines and commercial ships. The courses are sponsored by Babcock and Lloyd's Register Foundation.

Oliver said it was a great opportunity to develop team building, communication, time management, problem solving and presentations. There were also some social activities including a film evening and a trip to the local bowling alley finishing with formal dinners — one at the National Marine Aquarium and the other at St James' Park with the supervisors and industry guests.

When Oliver met with Mr Coles recently he said that he hoped the experience would help him achieve his ambition of an apprenticeship with Rolls Royce and that they would support him with his degree course at university.





Useful literacy and numeracy tips

- Make an estimation in Maths questions of what the answer should be—does your answer seem sensible?
- $54 \div 9 = ?$ Think of this question as $9 \times ? = 54$. Many students are stronger at multiplying than dividing
- Always show your workings they help the teacher see where and why mistakes may be made





- Encourage your child to read formal text, this could be done by downloading a news app on their smart phone and be read by them daily
- Stay sharp with puzzles—do crosswords and puzzles to improve your literacy.

The application process looks at how the arts are integrated across the college and how students take ownership of their own learning. The arts are a particularly strong area within Groby and students are able to take a range of subjects, which were celebrated in our bid.

The college applied late last year and received a visit from an assessor at the beginning of this term. The verifier was extremely impressed with the college's provision and the choice students are given within the arts.

"The college has a highly inclusive curriculum policy with much freedom

of choice. Many students elect to study three or even four arts subjects."

The wider whole college ethos of developing creativity was particularly important in our application. The use of techniques from performing and visual arts to develop students' learning was a key area of our application and the verifier was extremely complimentary of the college's work in this area.

"The college is more than keen to embrace the 'creative curriculum', and the arts play a huge role in promoting this vision in other subjects."

genuinely feel that their views are seriously considered and implemented in all their arts subjects. These were particularly evident in Photography and Performing Arts."





The trip is designed for students who we believe have the potential to thrive at university and who may be considering this pathway beyond Post 16. The day will include a range of interactive workshops and students will have the opportunity to talk with current undergraduates on what life is like at university.





Online Application for Further Education / Post 16 Courses

During November all Year 11 students will be guided (in their Life Skills lessons) to submit an application via UCAS Progress for their choice of further education, whether it be for A levels, vocational courses or apprenticeships.

In addition to the online application via UCAS progress, students wishing to apply to Post 16 will be given guidance by the Post 16 staff team during life skills lessons. They will be issued with a prospectus and a subject choices form to complete. The deadline for these applications is **Friday 12 December.**
