General Expectations

- Students are expected to attend all lessons and tutor time as required.
- Students are expected to be punctual to tutor time, assemblies and lessons (problems with punctuality will be followed up).
- Students are expected to follow the dress code.
- Students have been issued with lanyards which must be worn in college at all times.

The importance of regular attendance

When the outcomes from students of equal 'ability' are compared, those with attendance over 95% perform one grade higher per subject at A Level than those with attendance of 85% or less.

(Each further 10% fall reduces this by another grade)

- One week's holiday per year during term time = a 3% fall in attendance. This is the reason why holidays will not be authorised during term time.
- Wherever possible please arrange doctor/dentist appointments outside lesson time.

Leadership

All students in year 12 will be working on their leadership skills and qualities as part of tutor time. This work leads to an accredited qualification.

The three main areas of leadership are:

- Developing myself
- Contributing to my community
- Working with others

The main differences between KS4 and KS5

- The jump from KS4 to KS5 is probably the most difficult within the educational continuum.
- Fewer subjects are studied in much greater depth.
- Subjects are usually taught by 2 teachers, who may teach a different element of the course and have different teaching styles.
- Students need to be independent learners and a lot of learning takes place outside the classroom. Students will be set assignments, research and reading tasks for all subjects. These tasks will need to be completed during study time or as homework. It is essential that students work hard and have good organisational and time management skills.

Structure of Sixth Form study

3 or 4 AS or equivalent in Year 12.

(Each subject has 4 hours of lesson time every week. For each hour in the classroom, students should spend at least one hour on study outside the classroom)

• 3 or 4 A levels or equivalent in Year 13.

(To automatically be able to continue with a subject into A2 students need to achieve at least a grade D at AS)
